



When the batteries are connected in series, the galvanometer records a current of 1A and when the batteries are in parallel, the current is 0.6A. What is the internal resistance of each battery?



- 11. For the circuit diagram of a Wheatstone bridge shown in the figure, use Kirchhoff's laws to obtain its balance condition.




12. a. Three resistors $2\Omega, 4\Omega$ and 5Ω are combined in parallel. What is the total




resistance of the combination?

Answers

1. b.
$$\frac{1}{3}\Omega$$

Explanation: $E_1 = E_2 = 1.5$

Let internal resistance of battery be r. If batteries are connected in series then,

$$E = E_1 + E_2 = 3 V$$

$$T_{total} = 2r$$

Now.

$$I = rac{E}{(R+2r)} \ \Rightarrow 1 = rac{3}{(R+2r)}$$

$$R + 2r = 3 \dots (i)$$

If batteries are connected in parallel

$$E = 1.5V$$

$$\frac{1}{T_{total}} = \frac{1}{r} + \frac{1}{r}$$

$$T_{total} = \frac{r}{2}$$

and.

$$0.6 = \frac{1.5}{\left(R + \frac{r}{2}\right)}$$

$$\Rightarrow 0.6R + 0.3r = 1.5$$
 (ii)

on solving equation (i) and (ii)

$$r=rac{1}{3}\Omega$$

 d. Increase in the rate of collisions between the carriers and vibrating atoms of the conductor

Explanation: When temperature increases, the thermal speed of the electrons increases as well as, the amplitude of vibration of the positive ions inside the metal conductor also increase, about their mean positions. Thus, the collisions between the electrons and the positive metal ions become more frequent and this decreases the relaxation time, t, leading to an increase in the resistivity of the conductor.

3. a. 22.5 volt



Explanation: An ideal voltmeter does not draw any current. Therefore the resistances 4000 Ω and 3000 Ω are in series. The current in the circuit

$$I = rac{V_{4000}}{4000} = rac{30}{4000} A$$

The potential difference across the 3000 Ω resistor

$$V_{3000} = I \times 3000$$

 $\Rightarrow V_{3000} = \frac{3}{400} \times 3000$
 $V_{3000} = \frac{90}{4}$
 $V_{3000} = 22.5 V$

4. b. 1.6 V

CUITARITE **Explanation:** If the battery has an e.m.f E, the resistance of the potentiometer is R and internal resistance of the battery is r, then the current I flowing in the potentiometer wire is given as,


$$I = rac{E}{(R+r)}$$
 $I = rac{2}{(4+1)}$
 $I = 0.4 ext{ A}$

The potential difference V across the potentiometer is

$$V = I \times R$$

 $\Rightarrow V = 0.4 \times 4$
 $V = 1.6 \text{ V}$

- b. The algebraic sum of changes in potential around any closed loop must be zero. 5. **Explanation:** Kirchhoff's loop rule is based on the principle of conservation of energy. Since work done in transporting a charge in a closed loop is zero. The algebraic sum (since potential differences can be both positive and negative) of potential differences around any closed loop is always zero.
- 6. Variation of current versus voltage for the material Ga-As semiconductor material can be shown as -






It shows at first current increases with applied voltage and then decreases in non linear fashion.

7. To solve this problem we will use ohm's law which states that $V = I \times R$ 1/R = I/V

So slope of the graph is inversely proportional to resistance. Consider the figure,



Since, slope of 1 > slope of 2.

$$I_1/V_1 > I_2/V_2 \Rightarrow V_2/I_2 > V_1/I_1$$

..
$$R_2 > R_1$$

$$V/I = R$$

Also, we know that resistance is directly proportional to the temperature as $R_2 > R_1$ Therefore, $T_2 > T_1$.

8. The drift velocity is the average velocity that a particle, such as an electron, attains in a material due to an electric field. It can also be referred to as axial drift velocity. Given that number density in X = 2 × Number density in Y

$$\Rightarrow$$
 n_x = 2n_y ...(i)

As current is common for the entire circuit,

i.e.
$$I = n_X A_X e(v_d)_X = n_Y A_Y e(v_d)_Y$$

Also, the diameters of the wires are same

$$A_{X} = A_{Y}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{(v_{d})_{x}}{(v_{d})_{Y}} = \frac{n_{Y}}{n_{X}} = \frac{n_{Y}}{2n_{Y}} \text{ [From Eq. (i)]}$$

$$= \frac{1}{2}$$

so the required value is 0.5.



- Ga As (gallium arsenide) is most commonly used in making of a solar cell because it absorbs relatively more energy from the incident solar radiation being of relatively higher absorption coefficient.
- In balanced Wheatstone bridge if no current flow through galvanometer, that means while applying Kirchhoff's law, we can neglect this path.

No current flows through the galvanometer G when circuit is balanced.



On distributing currents as per Kirchhoff's first rule.

Applying Kirchhoff's second rule

$$\therefore -I_1 R_1 + (I - I_1) R_4 = 0$$

 $\Rightarrow I_1 R_1 = (I - I_1) R_4 \dots (i)$

ii. In mesh BCDB,

$$-I_1 R_2 + (I - I_1) R_3 = 0$$

 $\Rightarrow I_1 R_2 = (I - I_1) R_3 ...(ii)$

On dividing Eq. (i) by Eq. (ii), we get


$$\frac{I_1R_1}{I_1R_2} = \frac{(I-I_1)R_4}{(I-I_1)R_3} \Rightarrow \frac{R_1}{R_2} = \frac{R_4}{R_3}$$

This is necessary and required balanced condition of balanced Wheatstone bridge.

12. a. Total resistance of parallel combination,

$$rac{1}{R}=rac{1}{R_1}+rac{1}{R_2}+rac{1}{R_3} ext{ or } rac{1}{R}=rac{1}{2}+rac{1}{4}+rac{1}{5}=rac{10+5+4}{20}=rac{19}{20}\Omega$$
 or $R=rac{20}{19}\Omega$





b. Given voltage across the parallel

Combination V = 20 volt

Let the current through resistance $2\Omega, 4\Omega$ and 5Ω are I_1, I_2 and I_3 respectively.

Now
$$I_1=rac{V}{R_1}=rac{20}{2}=10A$$
 $I_2=rac{V}{R_2}=rac{20}{4}=5A$ $I_3=rac{V}{R_3}=rac{20}{5}=4A$

Total current, $I = I_1 + I_2 + I_3 = 10 + 5 + 4 = 19 A$

13. For BCD, equivalent resistance

$$R_1 = 5\Omega + 5\Omega = 10\Omega$$

Across BA, equivalent resistance R2,

$$\begin{array}{l} \frac{1}{R_2} = \frac{1}{10} + \frac{1}{30} + \frac{1}{15} \\ = \frac{3+1+2}{30} = \frac{6}{30} = \frac{1}{5} \\ \Rightarrow R_2 = 5\Omega \end{array}$$

Potential difference between points A and B,


$$V_{BA} = I \times R_2 = 0.2 \times 5$$

$$V_{BA} = 1V \Rightarrow V_{AB} = -1V$$

14. In DC circuit, initially capacitor is in steady state i.e. it offers infinite resistance.

Therefore, no current flows through capacitor and 4Ω resistance, so resistance will produce no effect.

 \therefore In circuit AB the Effective resistance between 2Ω and 3Ω which are connected in parallel combination is given by

Total resistance of the circuit = 1.2+ 2.8 = 4Ω [: these two are connected in series combination]

Net current drawn from the cell,

Given,

Voltage =6v

total resistance(R)= 4Ω

$$I = rac{V}{R ext{(total resistance)}} = rac{6}{4} = rac{3}{2} = 1.5 ext{A}$$

... Potential difference between A and B

$$V_{AB} = IR_{AB} = 1.5 \times 1.2 \Rightarrow V_{AB} = 1.80 \mathrm{V}$$

Current through 2Ω resistance,

we know that V=I'R

$$I' = V_{AB}/2\Omega = 1.8/2 = 0.9 \mathrm{A}$$

15. The resistance of the whole wire is 8Ω which is bent in the form of a circle.

When the wire is bent in circular form of radius 'r', the circumference of the circle is,

$$L = 2\pi r$$

$$\Rightarrow r = \frac{L}{2\pi}$$

A and B are two opposite points on the wire when bent in circular form.

The resistance of each such part will be Resistance of one part between A and B is $=rac{8}{L}[\pi r]=rac{8}{L}[\pi(rac{L}{2\pi})]=rac{8}{2}=4\Omega$

Similarly, resistance of the other part is also 4Ω .

From the figure, it is clear that both the parts are in parallel combination.

So, effective resistance between A and B is given by,

So, effective resistance between A and B is given by,
$$\frac{1}{R_{AB}} = \frac{1}{R_1} + \frac{1}{R_2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{R_{AB}} = \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{4}$$

$$A \longrightarrow A\Omega$$

$$\Rightarrow R_{AB} = \frac{4}{1+1} = 2\Omega$$
